Skip ad never: the Youtube ad crisis

Over the past few months there has been a growing boycott of YouTube ads. Hundreds of companies worldwide have been pulling their ads off of YouTube, causing Google to lose over \$1 billion in ad revenue which is causing many YouTube content creators to get paid fractions of what they earned before in ad revenue.

Hundreds of companies including McDonald's, Pepsi, Toyota, and even the British government have been pulling their ads from YouTube after becoming aware that there is a chance their advertisements could appear on mature and offensive content that they don't want to be associated with. Many marketers were quick to pull their ads in order to protect their brand and were using the scandal as an opportunity to potentially pay less for future ads.

This whole issue started when The Wall Street Journal posted an article showing a few examples of ads from big corporate brands alongside videos with racist titles and videos promoting terrorist organizations. Most did not see this as a big deal considering it rarely happens. Also, YouTube videos are monitored by an algorithm that demonizes videos with potentially offensive content. However, with over 300 hours of content uploaded every minute, a few videos are bound to slip through the cracks.

This method of stripping ads off offensive content was simply not enough for these brands to continue to trust YouTube so they continued to pull their ads out.

make content safer to advertise on. The first feature is the new restricted mode, which will <mark>not allow</mark> the user to see any videos with anything that may be considered offensive. This includes videos with coarse language, violence, or covering sensitive or controversial topics. The second feature allows advertisers to choose



YouTube's response to this issue has been slow, and on top of that their communication with content creators has been nearly nonexistent. However, lately YouTube has been putting in new features to try to reduce the risk for potential advertisers and to try and lure back those high profile brands they lost.

YouTube has implemented two key features to

the videos they would like to advertise on. These options range from all videos, to other extremely restricted content. These solutions are not the best, but an ideal one does not exist.

The main group this advertiser crisis is hurting is not Google itself, with assets totaling nearly \$170 billion, losing a billion dollars is not detrimental to the company. The people who are hurt

the most by this are the content creators on YouTube, whose largest income comes from ad revenue generated through their videos.

Some YouTube channels reported up to a 90% drop in their revenue due to the new restrictive modes and lack of advertisers on videos, which is a huge hit to those who have all their eggs in one basket. Some YouTubers have used their channels to launch other businesses and diversify their income.

For example, Casey Neistat, with 7.2 million subscribers recently sold his business "Beme" to CNN for \$25 million, and Philip De-Franco, with 5.4 million subscribers used his channel to launch his own news organization and clothing company. Despite this, some creators only make their money through YouTube ads which has caused a lot of people to panic.

This whole situation is only really affecting the little guy. At the end of the day, these huge global brands will do just fine without their ads on YouTube, but unfortunately, it is the content creators who get caught in the crossfire. Many creators and entertainers lose the majority of their money and are faced with potentially losing quite a bit of money over issues that are beyond their control.

Syrian war unfolds before the world

The peaceful uprising that arose in March of 2011 against Syrian President Bashar al-Assad escalated into a civil war, killing over 300,000 people and forcing approximately 1.6 million civilians to flee the country. according to the United Nations.

An article by BBC news states that the war began as a pro-democracy demonstration influenced by the Arab Spring in the southern city of Deraa, where many civilians voiced their complaints. The use of deadly force by the state caused numerous nationwide protests to break out, demanding the resignation of their president and the division between organized rebel groups and government forces fighting for national control.

Russia, aiming to "stabilise" the Syrian government after multiple defeats. claimed in September of 2015 that it would only target terrorists; however activists stated that its strikes mostly hit Westernsupported rebel groups, and the U.S,. on President Donald Trump's orders, made their first intentional attack on an ISIS-controlled air base named Shayrat in early April.

Apart from these divisions, ISIS, fighting inde-

pendently against all sects including government forces, rebel brigades, Kurdish troops, and Russian and American airstrikes led by the U.S. multinational coalition, controls large regions of northern and eastern

Syria. Thomas Bodor, an R.H. King Geography and Moderns teacher and the administrator of the KEQC, believes that the countries involved in the Syrian civil war should refrain from allowing their own inter ests to have a role in their decisions "It only seemed that the issue got attention once refuaees showed up

in crowds and ISIS became a threat to western countries... I'm growing concerned that this will blow up into a world war, USA and NATO need to show better leadership and facilitate diplomacy, not make rash emotional decisions without considering the consequences. I think Canada can be a leader in this area," Bodor

Today, more than 200,000 Syrians still wait to be granted refugee status and to be registered into countries that

will welcome them, and according to a Globe and Mail article, approximately four million civilians have fled the country. Canada successfully settled 46,700 refugees in 2016 of which 33,266 refugees were from Syria according to UNHCR. Canada hopes to continue supporting global refugee resettlement and civil society. Conditions for families are dangerous as they attempt to journey through

cross the European borders by sea usually have to endure exploitative work in areas such as Tripoli before they can reach safety and have to deal with the prospect of their boat capsizing, while those who attempt the journey by land live in extreme poverty and have to seek shelter in impoverished conditions.

Despite these challenges, many countries like Germany and Canada are trying

Turkey, Greece, and the Balkans to get to the EU countries. There are a leading number of deaths that are caused on board due to the lack food, water and medical supplies as well as sanitation.

Passengers are exposed to fear and violence on boat. Most refugees who

often a lack of student involvement, which potentially results in the inefficiency of providing what the school might need.




There are many ways that student can 'prompose' to someone. Some promposals are romantic with candles, flowers and chocolate, while others are cute and funny.


While King's own formal may have the budget limitation that does not mean it lacks quality.

The Eurovision Song Competition is one of the longest-running TV shows that ran from May 9-13 of this year. It is a multinational competition, similar to the Olympics, except with singing from around the world.

It features acts from the nations who are members of the European Broadcast Union; an alliance of public service broadcasters, as well as some countries outside of Europe.

Nations compete in two Semi-Finals, and those who win enter the Grand Final. Six nations are guaranteed a spot into the Grand Finalwith the Big Five which includes United Kingdom, Germany, France, Italy, and Spain.

The show's votes are based on both the jury and televoting to determine who wins the competition.

Eurovision was created after World War II as a means to bring war-torn Europeans together using the recently invented television as a medium.

"It is one of the most creative solutions for creating peace. The arts brings everyone together," Aloka Wijesundara, a Grade 10 student at R.H. King, says. The winner this year was Portugal with the song "Amar pelos dois" performed by Salvador Sobral. This was Portugal's first win in 53 years of participation, the longest winless run by a country in Eurovision history. More than 182 million people watched the live broadcast this year.



Review: the Nintendo Switch



The Switch has been a solid success for Nintendo so far and shows a lot of promise despite not having a lot of content.

When it was announced, one of the main fears with the Nintendo Switch was that it would feel heavy and chunky; similar to its predecessor, the Wii U, which failed to win over fans.

Out of the gate, however, the Switch is proving to be quite storng. The Switch feels surprisingly good in your hands; it's slim, and it weighs less than a pound, making it easy to hold while you are gaming for hours on end. The rounded edges and well placed buttons makes the Switch comfortable to hold for anyone no matter the size or shape of

your hand.

With the controllers (dubbed Joycons) you can also attach them to the "Joy Con Grip" to make it feel similar to an Xbox controller, or you can connect your system to your TV and play with a Pro Controller. There are many different ways to play your favourite games on the Switch.

When compared to other tablets and other portable consoles like the PS Vita and 3DS, the Switch is an absolute monster, but if compared to other home consoles like the 3-year-old PS4 and Xbox One the Switch does not even come close to being as powerful.

In order to allow the

console to be portable, Nintendo had to cram all of the console's internals onto the tiny screen you play your games on, which has really restricted what developers can do with the system.

One issue that a lot of gamers have noticed with the Switch is the large frame rate drops when there is a lot

happening on the screen at one time, which is once again due to the weaker graphics card and processor.

When Switch games are played on the TV it is easy to notice the lack of power in the system.

However, when played in portable, mode games look absolutely gorgeous. The small screen does a great job of hiding the lack of detail, the colours really pop, and it looks much better than the visuals on most tablets and portable devices. Also, the 32GB of internal storage is really lacking considering the OS takes up 7GB alone, making it nearly impossible to buy all of your games digitally, unless you buy a huge microSD.

One thing that has plaqued Nintendo consoles for the longest time is the lack of third party support. However, before the release of the Switch, Nintendo released an official statement releasing the names of nearly 50 third party game developers that will be working Switch games in the future. Unfortunately, there are only a handful of physical games out for the Nintendo Switch, which is underwhelming to say the least. The flip side is of course the monster hit Legend of Zelda: Breath of the Wild, which makes the Switch worth the price of admission alone.

Another great game right now is Mario Kart 8 Deluxe, but it's less a new game and more a port of an underappreciated existing title.

Because of how different the Switch is from the Xbox and PlayStation, developers have to work extra hard to port their games onto the console.

In addition, the Switch is very light on apps and features with an extremely bare bones online network. The system retails for \$399 plus tax.


they better than ever, with almost double the characters the super moves have been totally taken to the extreme!

Injustice 2 is now available for PS4, Xbox One, and




